Are you asking, "Now what do I need to do during the test?" Well that's simple. Just remember to stay cool, calm, and collected. Stay positive! Also, its a good idea to look over the test before you begin answering. This'll help you decide how to budget the time you're allowed. This also keeps you from staying on one question too long. Also, remember if you are questioning your answer always go with your first answer. Secondguessing yourself isn't going to get you anywhere. Make sure you read the question thoroughly. Don't assume what you think the rest of the question is going to be. You will end up misunderstanding the question. When you're finished the test double check your work to make sure you haven't missed any questions or answered any wrong. You'd be surprise how double checking your answers can save your life. Lastly make sure your handwriting is neat. If the teacher can't read your handwriting then she is going to count it wrong. Fixing your handwriting is probably One of the easiest tricks you






A FARM CROSSWORD PUZZLE
