Why Exercise is Cool

Kids exercise all the time without even thinking of it. Just being active, like when you run around outside or play kickball at school, is a kind of exercise. What else is exercise? Playing sports, dancing, doing push-ups, and even reaching down to touch your toes. When you exercise, you are helping build a strong body that will be able to move around and do all the stuff you need it to do. Try to be active every day and your body will thank you later!

Exercise Makes Your Heart Happy

You may know that your heart is a muscle. It works hard, pumping blood every day of your life. You can help this important muscle get stronger by doing aerobic (say: air-OH-bik) exercise. When you give your heart this kind of work out on a regular basis, your heart will get even better at its main job-delivering oxygen (in the form of oxygen-carrying blood cells) to all parts of your body. So you want to do some aerobic exercise right now? Try swimming, basketball, ice or roller hockey, jogging, or wa

Iking quickly), skating, soccer, or biking. And don't forget that skipping, jumping rope, and playing hopscotch are aerobic activities, too!

Exercise Strengthens Muscles

Another kind of exercise can help make your muscles stronger. Did you ever do a push-up or swing across the monkey bars at the playground? Those exercises can build strength. By using your muscles do powerful things, you can make them stronger. For older teens and adults, this kind of workout can make muscles bigger, too!

Exercises and Activities to Build Strong Muscles:

Push-ups or Pull-Ups Skating or Bike Riding Tug-of-war Rowing Running

Exercise Makes You Flexible

Can you touch your toes easily without yelling-ouch! Most kids are pretty flexible, which means that they can bend and stretch their bodies without much trouble. This kind of exercise often feels really good, like when you take a big stretch in the morning after waking up. Being flexible is having "full range of motion," which means you can move your arms and legs freely without feeling tightness or pain.

Activities to Help with Flexibility:

Tumbling and gymnastics Yoga or martial arts

Dancing, especially ballet Simple stretches, such as touching you toes or side Stretches

Exercise Keeps the Balance

Food gives your body fuel in the form of calories, which are kind of energy. Your body needs a certain amount of calories every day just to function, breathe, walk, and do all the basic stuff. But if you're active, your body needs an extra measure of calories or energy. If you're not very active, your body won't need as many calories. Whatever you calories need is, if you eat enough to meet the need, your body weight will stay about the same. If you eat more calories than your body needs, it may be stored as fat.

Exercise Makes You Feel Good

It feels good to have a strong, flexible body that can do all the activities you enjoy-like running, jumping, and playing with your friends. It's also fun to be good at something, like scoring a basket, hitting a home run, or perfecting a dive. But you may not know that exercising can actually put you in a better mood. When you exercise, your brain releases a chemical called endorphins (say: en-DOR-funz), which may make you feel happier. It's just another reason why exercise is cool!!
